Please keep your voices to a minimum as you explore the Field of Valor. Feel free to participate in the patriotic songs and other planned events, but remember to respect other visitors at all times.


There is no eating or drinking amongst the flags. No animals except official service animals are allowed on the field.

What is the Meaning Behind the 13 Folds of the U.S. Flag?

The flag-folding ceremony represents the same religious principles on which the United States was originally founded.

- 1. The first fold of our flag is a symbol of life.
- 2. The second fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.
- 3. The third fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.
- 4. The fourth fold represents our weaker nature; as American citizens trusting in God, it is Him we turn to in times of peace, as well as in times of war, for His divine guidance.
- 5. The fifth fold is a tribute to our country. In the words of Stephen Decatur, Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong.
- 6. The sixth fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.
- 7. The seventh fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of our republic.
- 8. The eighth fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mothers Day.
- 9. The ninth fold is a tribute to womanhood. It has been through their faith, love, loyalty and devotion that has molded the character of the men and women who have made this country great.
- 10. The 10th fold is a tribute to father, who has also given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first born.
- 11. The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.
- 12. The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies God the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.
- 13. The 13th and last fold, when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, In God We Trust.

OPENING DAY SPEAKER:

Drexel L. Smith USN (Ret.)



Drexel L. Smith is a US Navy veteran – Petty Officer 2nd Class - serving from 1964 to 1968. Service included over two years ('64-'66) on the USS Castor home ported in Sasebo Japan providing supplies at sea to ships on station off Vietnam, followed by 13 months with the Naval Advisory Group ('67-'68) as an advisor to the Vietnamese Navy. Smith was born in LA growing up in Van Nuys, settling in the San Gabriel Valley upon his return from Vietnam in 1968. Smith spent over 40 years in the independent test and engineering services business supporting defense, aerospace, energy and advanced technologies and is a recognized expert in the test and evaluation of space flight hardware, aircraft components, munitions, propulsion systems, nuclear systems and components.

Smith served as the Sr. VP/General Manager of Wyle Laboratories Technical Services group operating R&D, test facilities, test ranges and metrology laboratories for NASA & DoD to include propulsion labs for Air Force Research, Naval Weapons lab at China Lake, NASA Kennedy Space Center. Smith was responsible for Wyle's De-Mil program activities that included download, inspection and uploading of the BLU-97 sub-munitions, and numerous UXO identification and removal programs. As part of the UXO program activities Smith served on the DoD-Defense Science Advisory Board (DSB) sub-committee on landmines and UXO.

Smith today is principal of the Drexel Consulting Group, LLC, an executive management consulting group supporting corporations, new business start-up companies and non-profit board on governance issues.

Locally, Smith is recognized for his community service serving on various civic boards and committees including City of Walnut Planning Commission, elected to City Council for three, four-year terms and served as Mayor three terms. He currently is serving as Chair of the Mt San Antonio College Construction Bond Oversight Committee, is an active member of the Rotary Club of West Covina and supporter of the Field of Valor. Smith is a life-time member of the VFW and 'Counterparts' an organization of South-East Asia Advisors.



- Earned his Doctorate Degree from the Chicago School of Professional Psychology in Organizational Leadership














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VETERANS DAY PRAYER:




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COMMUNITY LUNCH SPEAKER:

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
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CLOSING DAY SPEAKER:

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EXCERPTS FROM THE U.S. FLAG CODE

Time and occasions for display

It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all weather flag is displayed.

The flag should be displayed on all days, especially on New Year's Day, January I; Inauguration Day, January 20; Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, third Monday in January; Lincoln's Birthday, February I2; Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February; National Vietnam War Veterans Day, March 29; Easter Sunday (variable); Mother's Day, second Sunday in May; Armed Forces Day, third Saturday in May; Memorial Day (half-staff until noon), the last Monday in May; Flag Day, June I4; Father's Day, third Sunday in June; Independence Day, July 4; National Korean War Veterans Armistice Day, July 27; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Constitution Day, September I7; Columbus Day, second Monday in October; Navy Day, October 27; Veterans Day, November II; Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November; Christmas Day, December 25; and such other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States; the birthdays of States (date of admission); and on State holidays.

The flag should be displayed during school days in or near every schoolhouse.

Position and manner of display

The flag, when carried in a procession with another flag or flags, should be either on the marching right; that is, the flag's own right, or, if there is a line of other flags, in front of the center of that line.

The flag should not be displayed on a float in a parade except from a staff, or as provided in subsection (i) of this section.

The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.

The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon only, then raised to the top of the staff.

Respect

The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the flag is flown.

I have slipped the bonds of Earth

and stood watch over the uncharted frontiers of space

from my vantage point on the moon.

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Military Flag Order

The Flag Code dictates the precedence of military flags. The American Flag is to the left of the military flags, then Army, Marine Corp, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, then Space Force.

Except the Coast Guard moves up to the right of the Navy when the Coast Guard serves in service of the Department of the Navy in time of war.
